The World Health Organisation (WHO) has announced that COVID-19 is a pandemic.

In Australia


As at 6.30am on 21 March 2020, there have been **874 confirmed cases** of COVID-19 in Australia. There have been 165 new cases since 6.30am yesterday.

*Note that under National Notifiable Diseases Surveillance System reporting requirements, cases are reported based on their Australian jurisdiction of residence rather than where they were detected. For example, a case reported previously in the NT in a NSW resident is counted in the national figures as a NSW case.

Of the 874 confirmed cases in Australia, 7 have died from COVID-19. More than 115,000 tests have been conducted across Australia.


This graph shows the number of confirmed cases by notification date. Interpret the most recently reported new cases shown in the graph with caution as there can be delays in reporting.



View text description and larger image of 'New and cumulative COVID-19 cases in Australia by notification date' graphic


To date, most confirmed cases are considered to have been acquired overseas although a large proportion are still under investigation to understand the source of infection.


View text description and larger image of 'COVID-19 cases in Australia by state and source of transmission' graphic

The majority of Australian confirmed cases acquired overseas had a recent history of travel to Europe or the Americas, predominately the United States of America.

Confirmed cases are seen across all age groups, with fewer cases reported in children and people over 70 years of age.
