The COVID-19 vaccine has arrived in Maine

When can I get vaccinated?

The supply of COVID-19 vaccines is limited, so they must be distributed in a phased approach. This approach is subject to change as Maine receives new vaccination guidance. Because it will take months for enough vaccine to be produced for people in the United States, Maine is following vaccine priority recommendations from a U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention [advisory group \(https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/acip/committee/role-vaccine-recommendations.html\)](https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/acip/committee/role-vaccine-recommendations.html). The U.S. CDC has not yet finalized these recommendations, and future adjustments are expected. As vaccine availability increases, these recommendations are expected to expand to include more groups.

Phase 1

1a: Health care workers and residents of long-term care facilities

1b: People age 75 and older and frontline essential workers

1c: People ages 65-74 , people ages 16-64 with high-risk medical conditions, and other essential workers

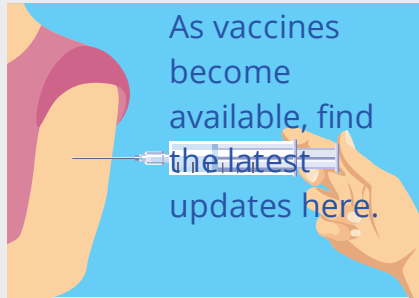
Phase 2

All people ages 16 and older who are not in Phase 1, with vaccine starting to become available to the general public.

Information for the Public

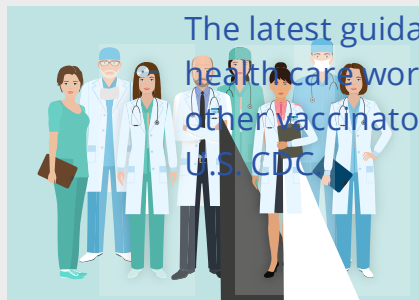
