When can I get vaccinated?

Because it will take months for enough vaccine to be produced in the United States, Maine is using a phased approach to providing vaccines that is generally consistent with recommendations from a U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention <u>advisory group. (https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/acip/committee/role-vaccine-recommendations.html)</u> As vaccine availability increases, more details will be provided. Maine is currently in Phase 1a.

The goals of Maine's vaccine distribution strategy are to protect emergency services and COVID-19 response infrastructure that Maine people rely on, and save lives by focusing on Maine people at greater risk of serious illness or death as a result of COVID-19.

Phase 1a: December through January

- Health Care Personnel
 Needed to Preserve Critical
 Health Care Services
- Residents and Staff of Long-Term Care Facilities
- Other Patient-Facing Health Care Personnel
- Public Safety Personnel
- COVID-19 Response
 Personnel

Phase 1b: February through April

- Older Mainers
- Adults of all Ages With High-Risk Medical Conditions
- Certain Front Line Essential Workers

Phase 1c: May and June

Other Essential Workers

Phase 2: June and Beyond

• Persons aged 16-64 not otherwise eligible in an prior phase.

How to get a vaccination

Health care, public safety, and critical COVID-19 infrastructure personnel should contact their employer or their professional associations to learn how to get a vaccine.

People age 70 and over may begin getting vaccinated, subject to vaccine availability and health system readiness, starting **January 18, 2021**. Health care providers authorized by Maine CDC for Phase 1b may start contacting patients to schedule a vaccine.

At this point, older Mainers should hold on calling their health care providers. Additional information on vaccination for people age 70 and older in Maine will be available the week of **January 18.**

Other people should come back to this website periodically to learn when and how they can get a vaccine.

Information for the public

Although the vaccine is here, COVID-19 remains a serious public health crisis. While the vaccination process is underway, Maine people should continue to <u>wear masks (PDF) (https://www.maine.gov/decd/sites/maine.gov.decd/files/inline-files/Face%20Covering%20FAQs.pdf)</u>, practice physical distancing and avoid gatherings at all times.
