

Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) Situation Report

Palau Ministry of Health - External Situation Report 20 March 2020 - 09:00 PWT

GLOBAL SITUATION OVERVIEW

The Ministry of Health (MOH) is closely monitoring an ongoing outbreak of a coronavirus disease that was first detected in Wuhan City, Hubei Province, China in December of 2019, which has now been exported to other countries. WHO Director General declared the outbreak as a Public Health Emergency of International Concern (PHEIC) on January 30, 2020, designated its official name as Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) on February 11, 2020 and characterized it as a *pandemic* on March 12, 2020.

As of March 20, 2020:

- At least 242,721* confirmed cases have been reported of COVID-19 globally; 81,165 cases within mainland China.
- 161,556* confirmed cases in 160 other countries and areas including 12 in Guam, 16 in Hawaii, 6 in French Polynesia and 1 in Fiji.
- 9,869* deaths reported globally 3,231 in mainland China, and 6,638 in 56 other countries and territories.
- 85,671* people have recovered from COVID-19 globally.

PALAU READINESS AND RESPONSE

As of March 20, 2020:

- There are NO SUSPECTED CASES of COVID-19 in Palau.
- MOH Emergency Operations Center (EOC) activated on Jan. 22, 2020 to implement preparedness and response measures to minimize the risk of importation and potential local transmission of COVID-19 to Palau.
- Belau National Hospital (BNH) now prepared to receive and care for critically ill suspected cases.
- Alternative Care Site (ACS) is currently being prepared to receive and care for critically ill suspected cases.
- Health screening initiated on Jan. 23, 2020 at Palau International Airport and Malakal seaport to screen all visitors to Palau. All travelers must complete a health declaration form and are subject to health screening. Screening data:
- Past 24 hours: 2 flights screened, 139 travelers; 0 vessels screened, 0 travelers; 54 secondary screening.
- Since Jan. 23: 159 flights screened, 14,804 travelers; 31 vessels screened, 1,224 travelers; 115 secondary screening.
- MOH 24-hour Hotline activated for public inquiries: +680-488-0555. Risk communication efforts sustained by MOH to relay credible and timely information to stakeholders and relevant information to the public and will continue to provide updates as they become available.
- Health Alert for travellers re-issued by MOH on Feb. 24, 2020 recommends avoidance of non-essential travel to mainland China, Hong Kong, Macau, Japan and South Korea.
- Executive Order 436 signed on Feb. 13, 2020 extends existing travel restrictions until Mar. 31,2020 temporary ban of direct flights and cruise ships originating from or transiting through mainland China, Hong Kong, or Macau into Palau, as well as temporary ban of entry of foreign travelers from these areas in the past 14 days.
- Executive Order 437 signed on Mar. 17, 2020 urging the collaboration of all government agencies in the COVID-19 response and extends existing travel restrictions until April 30, 2020.
- MOH issued a *Certification of an Unavoidable Public Health Emergency* for COVID-19 on Mar. 17, 2020, which mandates the scaling-up of clinical and public health response measures, and calls for a whole-of-government, whole-of-society approach to the COVID-19 pandemic threat.
- On Mar. 18, 2020 the Ministry of Education announced planned school closures from Mar. 23 Apr. 3, 2020 to prepare for potential import of COVID-19 cases.
- The public is urged not to panic and to continue practicing public health measures to prevent respiratory infections: Respiratory etiquettes: Cover cough and sneeze with clean tissue or shirt sleeve. Hand hygiene: Frequent handwashing with soap and warm water or hand rub with 70% alcohol-based sanitizer.
